



# Always Afternoon Daylily Hemerocallis 'Always Afternoon'

Hardiness Zone: 2

## **Description:**

Lovely, large violet blooms with a deep purple ring and light green throat; sturdy, strong, easy to care for, great grassy texture and form; good for the beginner gardener and the pro

#### **Ornamental Features**

Always Afternoon Daylily features bold violet trumpet-shaped flowers with green throats and a deep purple ring at the ends of the stems in early summer. The flowers are excellent for cutting. Its grassy leaves remain green in colour throughout the season.

## **Landscape Attributes**

Always Afternoon Daylily is an herbaceous perennial with a shapely form and gracefully arching foliage. Its relatively fine texture sets it apart from other garden plants with less refined foliage.

This is a relatively low maintenance plant, and is best cleaned up in early spring before it resumes active growth for the season. It is a good choice for attracting butterflies to your yard. It has no significant negative characteristics.

Always Afternoon Daylily is recommended for the following landscape applications;

- Mass Planting
- General Garden Use
- Groundcover

### **Planting & Growing**

Always Afternoon Daylily will grow to be about 18 inches tall at maturity, with a spread of 18 inches. When grown in masses or used as a bedding plant, individual plants should be spaced approximately 14 inches apart. It grows at a medium rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for approximately 10 years. As an herbaceous perennial, this plant will usually die back to the crown each winter, and will regrow from the base each spring. Be careful not to disturb the crown in late winter when it may not be readily seen!









This plant does best in full sun to partial shade. It is very adaptable to both dry and moist locations, and should do just fine under typical garden conditions. It is not particular as to soil type or pH. It is highly tolerant of urban pollution and will even thrive in inner city environments. This particular variety is an interspecific hybrid. It can be propagated by division; however, as a cultivated variety, be aware that it may be subject to certain restrictions or prohibitions on propagation.
